Horatio Spafford wrote "It Is Well With My Soul" in the midst of a great personal tragedy. He had sent his wife and four daughters ahead to visit Europe while he planned to follow as soon as he took care of some business. While crossing the Atlantic, the ship was hit by another vessel and sank into the sea. Horatio's wife, Anna, survived the icy waters but the four girls did not. Anna sent her husband a telegram "Saved Alone".

Horatio immediately boarded a ship to go and be with Anna. On the sea journey he asked the captain to point out the spot where his daughters had gone into the waters. While he thought about their bodies down at the bottom of the ocean, he was struck by a certainty that the girls were safe and happy in the arms of God. As he contemplated the terrible event, his heart was broken but his faith was strong. It was on the rest of this trip that he wrote the words to "It Is Well With My Soul".

When peace like a river attendeth my way
When sorrows like sea billows roll
Whatever my lot, You have taught me to say
It is well, it is well with my soul.

When I read these words knowing the author's circumstances, my own faith grows stronger. In the midst of hard things, when my heart is broken, I can still affirm God's goodness and declare "It is well with my soul."



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The Rector's Message for Lent

Ash Wednesday, the 6th of March 2019 is the start of the Season of Lent. It is a favorable time for renewal of our life and our mission. As the congregation of Jesus Our Savior Anglican Church, I propose our MISSION STATEMENT as the framework of and guide to the Lenten journey of renewal:

"The mission of Jesus Our Savior Anglican Church is to know Jesus Christ and to make him known."

"TO KNOW JESUS CHRIST", the first half of our Mission Statement, contains three important and privileged ways of knowing the Lord Jesus Christ. These three ways are also the three main areas of our Lenten renewal.

(1) We know Jesus in his Word: This means in the inspired Word of God, the Sacred Scriptures.

This Lenten Season, we spend a few minutes of reflection before Sunday mass on the Scriptures as explained in the Catechism. Every Friday at 10:00 a.m., we have Bible Study. We have Sunday School, and youth Bible Study every 3rd Sunday. Let us find time to join these schedules of small groups. This, however does not dispense our own personal reading and reflection on the Word of God especially this Lenten season.

(2) We know Jesus in the Sacraments and in prayer, especially the Holy Eucharist.

This Lenten Season, we will have these opportunities for Eucharistic worship and prayer: the Sunday 10:00

a.m. Mass, the Friday 10 a.m. morning prayer, the Fridays' noon Stations of the Cross and Reflection; Confession on Fridays; 2 p.m. Services for Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Vigil.

(3) We know Jesus in our service to one another and especially those in need.

This Lenten Season, we will try our best to consciously devote ourselves to concrete everyday works of mercy and compassion: by feeding the hungry through the Food Basket, by sending cards, by calling or by visiting the sick and the lonely, by comforting the bereaved and broken hearted, by supporting the ministry of the Second Chance Computers and Shared Blessings.

Let us not let the Season of Lent pass without renewing our commitment to know Jesus more and more. Above all, let us not forget the SECOND PART of our mission statement: AND TO MAKE HIM KNOWN.

My prayer is for us all to find ways of making Jesus known especially during this Lenten Season.

Bishop's Note - The Proper Sanctus

In our ongoing study of the Service of Holy Eucharist from the 2019 Book of Common Prayer (BCP) we have turned to the Eucharistic Prayer examining last week the Proper Preface. This week we join with the heavenly chorus in what is known as The Sanctus:

The Sanctus

Celebrant and People

Holy, Holy, Holy, Lord God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory.

Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

Hosanna in the highest.

At this point in the liturgy the congregation and the ministers are all standing in prayer and adoration when we say or sing together the ancient words of scripture – the three -fold HOLY. "Holy, Holy, Holy, Lord God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest."

We cannot say these words without the heavenly images of Isaiah and the book of Revelation:

'In the year that King Uzziah died I saw the Lord sitting upon a throne, high and lifted up; and the train of his robe filled the temple.2 Above him stood the seraphim. Each had six wings: with two he covered his face, and with two he covered his feet, and with two he flew. 3 And one called to another and said: "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory!" (Isaiah 6:1-3)

This amazing image given to the prophet Isaiah was fulfilled in the Book of Revelation when St. John was shown the image of the throne of God:

'From the throne came flashes of lightning, and


rumblings and peals of thunder, and before the throne were burning seven torches of fire, which are the seven spirits of God, 6 and before the throne there was as it were a sea of glass, like crystal.

And around the throne, on each side of the throne, are four living creatures, full of eyes in front and behind: 7 the first living creature like a lion, the second living creature like an ox, the third living creature with the face of a man, and the fourth living creature like an eagle in flight. 8 And the four living creatures, each of them with six wings, are full of eyes all around and within, and day and night they never cease to say, "Holy, holy, holy, is the Lord God Almighty, who was and is and is to come!" (Rev. 4:5-8)

As we worshipfully proclaim these words we join with Angels and Archangels, Saints past and present in the worship of the Lord in a foretaste of what is to come in heaven.

After the three-fold Holy – we proclaim "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest." In this moment we join with the people of Jerusalem as Jesus made his triumphant entry. At every celebration of the Holy Eucharist Christ makes his triumphal entry into our churches, our hearts, and our minds. It is therefore not only appropriate but our duty to shout the praises of the Lord!

I pray that on this, the Last Sunday of Epiphany, as you gather for worship and reverently proclaim the Sanctus your hearts will be filled to overflowing with the gratitude that comes from knowing and loving Jesus Christ, the Only Son of God!

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To God You Shall Return

The traditional Ash Wednesday words "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return" might seem depressing. But in our often death-denying culture, some might find it refreshing to hear the frank statement that we can do nothing to save ourselves, physically or spiritually — that, no matter how we try to avoid sin, we can't untangle ourselves from self-interest. How liberating, then, to know we don't have to! God loves us as we are and sent Jesus to break sin's power over us.

A pastor described Ash Wednesday as the point you can pinch in the middle of a long piece of ribbon, such that when you lift it high, the two ends — one symbolizing our baptism and the other, our funeral — meet and touch. We come from dust and will return to dust, but we also come from God and will return to God. Ash Wednesday reminds us that we're always safe in God's love.
